Free Health check-up and awareness camp

The Basara Educational and Welfare Society (BEWS) is committed to improving the health and well-being of communities in Bihar. As part of our ongoing efforts, we organized two free diabetes, blood pressure and hemoglobin check-up and awareness camps in Khajuria Arerajmarg's Ramesh Prasad market and Basara Shukl Middle School, Saraiya Muzaffarpur



The Objective of the Health check-up and awareness camps:

- To provide free diabetes and blood pressure screenings and consultations to the local population.
- To raise awareness about diabetes and blood pressure and their complications.
 - To offer guidance and support to

individuals diagnosed with diabetes and blood pressure.

Details of the Health check-up and awareness camps Activities:

- A team of qualified medical professionals conducted diabetes and blood pressure screenings and consultations.
- Over 525 people participated in the two camps.
- 75 individuals were diagnosed with diabetes and 88 with blood pressure.
- 424 medicines were distributed to patients with diabetes and blood pressure.
- 362 patients with other ailments also benefited from the camps.

Impact of the Health check-up and awareness camps:

- The camps successfully reached a significant number of individuals in need.
- Many participants expressed gratitude for the opportunity to receive free healthcare.



• The camps contributed to early detection and management of diabetes and blood pressure, potentially preventing serious complications.

Free Blanket Distribution Camps

During the winter season, the Basara Educational and Welfare Society

launched a humanitarian initiative to distribute blankets, shawls, and warm clothing to underprivileged individuals in Muzaffarpur and West Champaran districts. Over 1000 people benefited from these 5 blanket donation camps, which were conducted from January 17th to 29th, 2022.



Objectives of the Blanket Donation Camp:

- To provide essential warmth and comfort to those in need.
- To alleviate the suffering caused by cold weather.
- To demonstrate our commitment to social welfare.

Activities during the Blanket donation camps:

- Blankets, shawls, and warm clothing were distributed to underprivileged individuals in Muzaffarpur and West Champaran districts.
- The campaign was conducted from January 17th to 29th, 2022.
- Over 1,000 people benefited from this initiative.

Impact of the Blanket Donation camp:

- The blanket distribution drive provided much-needed relief to vulnerable populations during the winter season.
- Many recipients expressed gratitude for the warmth and comfort provided.
- The initiative highlighted BEWS's dedication to serving the community.



HIV/AIDS Intervention Report among Youth and Adolescents by Basara Educational and Welfare Society (BEWS)

Intervention Areas: Saran, Samastipur, Patna, Muzaffarpur & East Champaran

1. Introduction

The HIV/AIDS intervention program led by Basara Educational and Welfare Society (BEWS) in the districts of Saran, Samastipur, Patna, Muzaffarpur, and East Champaran aimed to address the rising risk of HIV transmission among youth and adolescents. This demographic is particularly vulnerable due to various factors such as lack of awareness, experimentation with risky behaviours, peer pressure, and limited access to accurate sexual health education. The objective of this initiative was to increase awareness, provide accurate knowledge about HIV/AIDS, and promote healthy behaviours that reduce the risk of HIV among young people.

2. Background and Context

Youth and adolescents often lack comprehensive sexual health education, which leads to misconceptions about HIV and its transmission. In the districts targeted by BEWS, several challenges hindered effective HIV prevention:

- Limited access to accurate information on HIV and sexual health in schools and communities.
- Peer pressure and risky behaviours (e.g., unprotected sex, substance use) that contribute to HIV transmission.
- Cultural taboos around discussing sexual health, which prevents open conversations about HIV prevention.
- Lack of HIV testing and awareness of available services.

This intervention sought to bridge these gaps by engaging youth and adolescents through targeted education, outreach, and support systems.

3. Objectives of the Intervention

The primary objectives of the HIV/AIDS intervention program among youth and adolescents were:

- Increase awareness about HIV/AIDS, its transmission, prevention, and treatment options.
- Promote safe sexual practices, including condom use and HIV testing.

- Encourage responsible decision-making and healthy behaviours among youth.
- Reduce stigma related to HIV/AIDS within schools, communities, and peer groups.
- Provide accessible services (e.g., HIV testing, counseling, and referrals for further care) to young people.

4. Target Population

The intervention primarily focused on:

- Adolescents (ages 12-18): Students in schools, youth groups, and communities who are particularly vulnerable to HIV due to experimentation, lack of knowledge, and peer influence.
- Young Adults (ages 19-24): Individuals who are transitioning from adolescence into adulthood and may be engaging in more independent, riskier behaviours.
- At-risk youth: Including those involved in substance use, commercial sex work, or other high-risk behaviours.

5. Key Activities

The intervention included various activities tailored to reach and engage youth and adolescents across different communities.

a) Awareness Campaigns and Education

School and College Workshops:
 BEWS organized workshops in schools, colleges, and youth centers across the targeted districts.

These workshops focused on:

- Understanding HIV transmission and prevention.
- The importance of using condoms during sexual activity.
- Myths and misconceptions about HIV.
- Promoting regular HIV testing and sexual health checkups.

• Peer Education Programs:

Trained peer educators, often young people themselves, were recruited from schools and colleges. These peer educators played a critical role in reaching their peers, breaking down barriers of communication, and ensuring the information was relatable. They also facilitated discussions around healthy

relationships, responsible sexual behavior, and reducing stigma.

• Community Outreach and Sensitization:

BEWS organized outreach events in local markets, bus stations, and community centers. These outreach events included skits, interactive sessions, and distribution of educational materials, such as posters, leaflets, and condoms, to raise awareness about HIV prevention and care.

• Social Media Campaigns:

Leveraging the popularity of social media among youth, BEWS launched digital campaigns using platforms like Facebook, Instagram, and YouTube to spread awareness. These campaigns included informative posts, videos, and live Q&A sessions with healthcare professionals.

b) HIV Testing and Counseling

Youth-Friendly HIV Testing Centers:

Mobile HIV testing units were stationed in areas where youth typically gather, such as near schools, colleges, and parks. These testing units offered free and confidential HIV testing along with counseling services. Special efforts were made to ensure that testing services were youth-friendly and non-judgmental.

Counseling and Support Services:

In addition to HIV testing, BEWS provided psychological counseling for youth who tested positive for HIV or were seeking information about prevention and care. Peer counselors were also available to offer support and reduce the stigma associated with HIV.

c) Condom Distribution and Safe Sex Education

• Free Condom Distribution:

BEWS distributed free condoms in schools, colleges, and public spaces where youth gather. Information about condom use, including demonstrations on correct usage, was provided through workshops and outreach programs.

• Education on Safe Sex Practices:

Workshops emphasized the importance of practicing safe sex and using condoms to prevent HIV and other sexually transmitted infections (STIs). Interactive activities, such as condom use demonstrations and role-playing scenarios, were used to engage the youth and improve retention of information.

d) Interactive Peer Group Sessions

Youth Clubs and Support Groups:

BEWS established youth clubs and support groups where young people could discuss sexual health, HIV, relationships, and prevention in a comfortable and safe space. These groups were led by trained facilitators and provided a platform for sharing concerns, experiences, and information.

• Interactive Sessions on Healthy Relationships:

Workshops and group discussions focused on building healthy relationships, recognizing the signs of abuse, and making informed decisions regarding sexual health.

e) Partnerships with Schools and Local Authorities

• With School Curriculum Integration:

BEWS collaborated educational institutions to integrate HIV awareness into the school curriculum. Teachers and school counselors were trained to address questions related to HIV and sexual health in a sensitive, informative, and non-judgmental manner.

• Collaboration with Local Healthcare Providers:

BEWS worked with local health departments and healthcare providers to ensure access to HIV testing, treatment, and counseling services. These partnerships helped to provide a referral system for youth who needed further medical attention.

6. Challenges Faced

While the intervention achieved significant success, several challenges were encountered:

• Stigma and Cultural Barriers:

The topic of HIV and sexual health is still considered taboo in many communities, making it difficult for young people to openly discuss their concerns and seek help.

Limited Resources for Ongoing Programs:

The demand for HIV awareness and testing services among youth was high, but resources were limited, which sometimes hindered the capacity to reach all interested individuals.

Reluctance to Seek Testing:

Many adolescents were hesitant to undergo HIV testing due to fear of confidentiality breaches and social stigma.

Geographical Barriers:

Some of the rural areas, especially in districts like East Champaran and Muzaffarpur, presented logistical challenges for organizing outreach events and providing services to remote youth populations.

7. Outcomes and Impact

The HIV/AIDS intervention program successfully made a positive impact on youth and adolescents in the target areas:

Increased HIV Awareness:

Post-intervention surveys indicated a significant increase in knowledge about HIV transmission, prevention, and treatment options among youth.

• Higher Uptake of HIV Testing:

There was an increased number of young people seeking HIV testing, with many using the mobile testing units and accessing counseling services.

• Behavioral Change:

A considerable number of youth reported an increased use of condoms and safer sexual practices after participating in the educational programs.

• Reduced Stigma:

Youth who participated in the intervention became more open in discussing HIV and sexual health with their peers, leading to a reduction in stigma associated with the disease.

8. Recommendations for Future Interventions

• Expand educators Peer Education Programs:

Engaging more peer can amplify the reach of the program, particularly in remote and underserved areas.

• Continuous Awareness Campaigns:

More focus should be placed on continuous, year-round awareness campaigns, particularly utilizing digital platforms that are popular among youth.

• Increase Mobile Testing Units:

Expanding the availability of mobile HIV testing units in rural and high-traffic youth areas will ensure greater access to testing and counseling services.

• Integration into National Programs: The program should be integrated into national school curricula to ensure that HIV education reaches all adolescents across the country.

9. Conclusion

The HIV/AIDS intervention by Basara Educational and Welfare Society has made meaningful strides in raising awareness, promoting healthy behaviors, and providing HIV-related services to youth and adolescents in Saran, Samastipur, Patna, Muzaffarpur, and East Champaran. While challenges remain, particularly in overcoming stigma and expanding resources, the program has successfully contributed to reducing HIV transmission risks and improving the health of young people in the targeted regions.

- Partnerships: We seek financial and technical partners to help us launch this initiative as soon as possible.

2. Flood Relief:

- Annual Impact: Bihar experiences heavy rainfall and flooding every year, affecting millions of people.
- Family Support Kits: The BEWS aims to initiate flood relief activities by developing a specialized "Family Support Kit." This kit will contain essential items such as dry ration/food, medicines, and other daily necessities.
- Immediate Assistance: These kits will be distributed to affected families to

provide immediate support.
